Reading: Luke 2: 22-40

Simeon's story must have had a significant impact on Rembrandt. He painted 3 different versions of the painting. One at the beginning of his career and the last still incomplete when he died. The painting shown here is an early one painted when Rembrandt was 25. Rembrandt captures well Simeon's gravitas and intensity as he speaks to Mary: "This child is chosen by God for the destruction and the salvation of many in Israel. He will be a sign from God which many people will speak against and so reveal their secret thoughts. And sorrow, like a sharp sword, will break your own heart" 1. Mary is staring at child Jesus in amazement and incredulity. Anna, the prophetess is jubilant as she lifts her hands in praise while gazing at the child Jesus. Joseph is in the shadows kneeling with Mary with his back to the viewer. The scene is of joy and celebration yet with an undertone of trepidation.

The overall focus of the painting is Simeon's conversation with Mary on the extraordinary upheaval the child is going cause. Simeon prophetically points to the destabilising nature of Jesus. The destiny of nations and its people is going to hang on their response to the claims of Jesus. James Russell Lowell's hymn written in 1845 captures well the essence of Simeon's words:

Once to ev'ry man and nation
Comes the moment to decide,
In the strife of truth and falsehood,
For the good or evil side;
Some great cause, some great decision,
Off'ring each the bloom or blight,
And the choice goes by forever
'Twixt that darkness and that light

And, individually, Jesus confronts us with the reality of our inmost thoughts laying bare our true nature and character. The message grates our normal human sensibilities. It does not yield to our efforts to contain it. The choice before us is either to surrender or to go our own way in rebellion. Jesus does not offer a middle path. This is what makes the message confrontational.

Simeon implies the heavy price Jesus will pay as the 'stone that causes people to stumble and a rock that makes them fall'². And Mary would be an anguished bearer of this Rock. Mary's own song - 'magnificat'³ is utterly subversive. It talks about the world and its systems already turned upside down. Such a message cannot be borne lightly or declared with ease. We carry this 'divisive' message of Christ in anguish.

We celebrate Christmas with much joy and celebration. Rightly so, because the birth of Jesus is a 'good news of great joy'. The good news to us comes at a price. And so will be to us as we become 'good news' to the world. That is precisely the pathos that Rembrandt captures in this marvellous painting.

TAMIL NADU STATE CONFERENCE - PACHALUR 2017

A short report by Sharon & Vineeth, CMC, Vellore

Jesus exhorted us to be the salt and light of the world, just as He was. And how would one do that -without ever so slightly becoming either hyper or hypotonic? These aspects were beautifully brought out during each session of this Conference. Surrounded by nature at the Morning rock, we heard afresh the various facets of the Cross – the central, focal point of Christianity by Deva Uncle, which left us in awe of the Savior's love for us. If you thought that you could do great things for God individually, you are mistaken, Dr Vinod said, 'Because God is interested in communities and works through them', just as He did in the case of Asha Kiran, Lamtaput. The sessions on Missions, taken by Drs. Deepak and Ashita Singh, brought out the fact that Christians being transformed by their own walk with God, strategically placed in various positions, as a side effect, transform others around them. For this to happen, we need to become His disciples, choosing to take up our cross, being poor in the Spirit and refusing to take pride in human havings, doings and sayings. Dr Chandra Singh spoke on identity 'Who Am I?' The talk on 'Taming the tongue' by Dr Sam Siddhartha was an encouragement to speak life, truth, liberation, healing and justice, to build up others around us just as Jesus did. Letting God prepare us for marriage by Dr Susheel Tharian, brought out the various aspects that we, as young people should consider before and after choosing our life partners and the various ways in which each of us are wired differently, yet reflecting His glory in being united in marriage.

Pachalur 2017 was a great time of fun and fellowship with over one hundred medical students from across south India, living and learning together. The delicious food, spacious accommodation and all the other arrangements were very organized and adequately prepared by Drs Anu and Philip from Christian Fellowship Hospital, Oddanchatram. The power of God's word to transform lives was very evident in that the sessions spoke to each of us individually, and yet the overarching message and challenge to us was very clear: God is on His mission, very much concerned and interested in today's world! The evidence of His working is abundantly clear to anyone who chooses to look and listen to Him. Are we willing to join Him and pour out our very lives, that the Lamb who was slain might receive the reward – the joy that was set before Him for which He endured the cross, despising its shame? Or are we simply content to miss this mission and live out our own mundane lives, concerned only about ourselves and not feeling God's heart which beats for the poor and oppressed people? Are we willing to become a part of His Story, loving His people, on His mission? The answers to these questions can change your life.

The rumble and tumble of the journey:

We left CMC, Vellore at 1 am in 2 busses in the wee hours of the morning. Added to the late departure, were the heavy, torrential rains and the dysfunction of the headlights of one of the buses we were travelling in. Waiting for dawn to break and the downpour to stop was one of the things we'd never thought would happen. After a successful journey and breakfast at Trichy, we, finally reached ODC, by God's immense grace, at 2 pm in the afternoon, had lunch and rested for a little while. The following three days were just phenomenal. And when we were going back to Vellore, we still had the headlights and the windshield of one of the buses to be repaired. One mechanic after the other turned the repair down, because it was a complicated issue, or so they said. Finally, one gentleman fixed it for us. Well, if you thought that this was all that had to happen, you're mistaken. The oil tank in the seemingly better bus seemed to have sprung a leak, and, we were stuck in the middle of nowhere trying to plug it. Half an hour and a series of prayers later and a stop for dinner, we were on our way to Vellore. Finally, exhausted, yet glad to have reached safely, we arrived at CMC at 4 am. Through all of this, one thing that struck me was; no matter how much you plan, God has His ways of stretching your faith. By taking us through difficult situations, He reveals Himself as a sufficient God and nudges us to trust in Him, when we either, are complacent in our own ways or in other words, in our comfort zone. And He safely leads us through.

FEED BACK FROM STUDENTS

- Through the sessions, I came to fully understand, "How can I, a sinner, be born-again in the spirit and enter the kingdom of God."
- The Conference has helped me see that God does have a plan for me and I should let Him take control of my life and lead me wherever His will takes me. I do not know what are His plans for me yet, but I am willing to do His will.

MEDICAL NEWS- ETHICS Charlie Gard and the limits of medicine The Lancet(Published: 05 August 2017)

The heartbreaking story of an 11-month-old baby boy, Charlie Gard, has dominated newspaper headlines in the UK, and more widely, over the past few months. Last week, Charlie's parents, Connie Yates and Chris Gard, ended their legal fight to transfer their son to the USA for experimental treatment. After further court hearings to decide where Charlie should die, he was transferred to a children's hospice. On July 28, Charlie died.

Reflections on why decisions about Charlie's care ended up being made in court are important. Fundamentally, it was because no agreement could be reached between his parents and his clinical team. Charlie had a rare form of encephalomyopathic mitochondrial DNA depletion syndrome (specifically the RRM2B mutation) and was a patient in Great Ormond Street Hospital (GOSH). There is no proven treatment for his disorder. For most of his short life, Charlie was ventilated in the intensive care unit, in December, he began to have severe seizures. The GOSH team concluded that his brain damage was severe, and that his life support should be switched off. But Charlie's parents disagreed, saying that he did not have irreversible brain damage and that he was able to respond to their touch. Charlie's parents argued that they had the ultimate right to make decisions about Charlie's care. They raised more than £1•3 million to pay for experimental nucleoside therapy in the USA. With no agreement between his parents and his clinicians, GOSH applied to the High Court, and, on April 11, Mr Justice Francis ruled that it was in Charlie's best interests to stop life support. Charlie's parents then lost their appeal against the judgment, and pursued their fight in the Supreme Court, then in the European Court of Human Rights, to no avail. In July, Pope Francis and President Trump offered support to Charlie's parents. The doctor who had offered to give nucleoside treatment to Charlie in New York reviewed the case details and retracted his offer. Meanwhile, the staff at GOSH, their families, and Charlie's parents all received abuse and threats.


At the heart of this sad story is a breakdown of trust and communication between Charlie's parents and the clinical team at GOSH, but also fundamental disagreement over the extent of Charlie's brain damage, and about who has the right to make decisions about his care. Since February, GOSH's position has been that every day that passed was a day that was not in Charlie's best interests. For Charlie's parents, however, hope (perhaps given in vain) and love sustained their fight for their son. They believe that had their son received the experimental treatment sooner, he would have had a chance. When the limits of medicine are reached, communicating those limits to parents falls to paediatricians or intensivists, and

is undeniably difficult to do. Clinical decisions are rarely black or white, and communicating the shades of grey can be extraordinarily difficult, especially when a baby is involved. Finding the right time and place, allowing time to reflect, ask questions, and revisit the conversation are all essential, and it is a hard skill to learn. The level of pain and suffering, and whether any treatment can prolong life, has to be taken into account. Faith-based considerations might be important to discuss, especially if either parent holds a strong religious point of view. Usually, an agreement can be reached, and it is rare that lack of consensus ends with a court application. Mediation between all parties might be valuable to consider as a step before coming to court, and the Judge in Charlie's case suggested it should be compulsory, although at times it too may fail. The overriding principle in UK law is to consider what is in the best interests of the baby; this is not the case in all countries.

When no treatment for a disease exists, Dominic Wilkinson and Julian Savulescu in a Comment in this issue propose an ethical framework for deciding on access to experimental treatment. However, clinicians should avoid giving false hope. "The child first and always", GOSH's slogan, has to be at the heart of clinical decision making.

Charlie's legacy could include further work on best practice guidelines for mediation between clinical teams and parents, agreement on a framework for use of experimental treatment, appropriate and timely focus on palliative and hospice care, and encouragement to clinicians offering an alternative treatment to ensure they have full knowledge of the facts of the case. For now, though, the grief of Charlie's family and of all those who knew and cared for Charlie must be respected.



GROUND REALITIES - WHEN THE TYRE HITS THE ROAD



In 1998 we moved to Bolangir, western part of Odisha to work in a CNI hospital. This was in obedience to God and disobedience to many of our friends (as they discouraged us). Western Odisha is a poor and backward district in terms of development and economy but no less in terms of Spirituality. We continued to involve ourselves in the Church, started English Sunday school and spoken English class for the EU students. We always believed that if there is nothing, start something. God is ever more than willing to pioneer and walk with us. In 2001 we moved to Purulia, West Bengal to join The Leprosy Mission Hospital. Purulia is known for two reasons: the Arms Drop and the oldest leprosy center. This hospital is 129 years old today and a consecrated place started by the German missionary Rev. Uffman. But leprosy work is never glamorous with lots of discrimination (even among health care providers). But because of this very reason, we continued to work, as we believed that people affected by leprosy are also created in the image of God. But we never left the work among the medical students. We visited the students of the nearby medical colleges, invited medical students to our home and the hospital and moved on. For three years I was a married bachelor (not anymore) as Deepa went to CFH, Oddanchatram to do her Family Medicine.

Now the Leprosy Mission hospital provides Dermatology, General Medicine, General Surgery, Ophthalmology and Orthopedics apart from comprehensive leprosy care.

Having worked 26 years in Mission Hospitals we can say it is difficult, painful, disappointing, challenging but at the same time rewarding and satisfying as it draws us closer to God and to also see people that society neglects/rejects, cared for. What other joy can you expect when you see a young girl rejected and thrown out of her home due to leprosy, back with a smile, looking upon you as family with joy and hope? This is what we are called for. Are Mission Hospitals still relevant today? Only an insider who has worked with the needy, poor and neglected will say YES. And those who look at medicine as a glamourous status symbol will say NO. The need is even more than IT WAS! The daily news is enough to challenge us that truth, values and love are non-existent. If you and I do not stand for it, Who Will? We believe that's why God has called us to this profession. Young students, please note: If you want to follow God and do good, you only need one reason to do it. If you are not interested, you will have a hundred reasons (excuses) not to do it. Either way, there are consequences.

We are blessed with a daughter Abigail doing her PG in Advertising and Marketing at Xavier's Institute of Communication, Mumbai.

Hopefully, we will get a house soon and all are welcome if you happen to be in Delhi or visit Delhi.



Special EMFI meetings like "Download', 'Upload', State Conferences, Mission camps, Leadership Seminars, Marriage Enrichment Seminars, Parenting seminars, Per-Marital Seminars and the like abound for those in the South of India and in the North East. How can we make them available to those in North India? To address this question, we have been considering having a coordinating centre in North India. Deliberations and trials are on. We need your prayers and involvement.

Some states in our country have been missing out on experience of His love through 'Organised Christian Healthcare'. We need to pray for men and women to arise and bless these States. The opportunities are aplenty.

The Saline Process is a wonderful way to care for the whole person by bringing to him/her the love of the Lord. It would be good for each of us to go through this training. If students/graduates can get together for a day, the Saline Process training can be arranged.

The Marriage Enrichment Seminars have brought a fresh fragrance into the lives of many a Christian family including ours. It is our wish that we will be able to bless every State with this wonderful program. Many of our friends have taken it and have been blessed.

The 'Kingdom of God Seminar' is an exciting discipleship course for Graduates. It offers a graphic view of God's mission rooted in Christ. The seminar is followed by a specially designed Bible Study course which can radically alter the way we go about our lives.

The Bioethics Book has begun to gain traction. Some groups of students have even completed the book with the help of senior graduates like Dr Starlin. In the recent conference at Bhopal, students reported that they were helped much with the sessions done by Dr Jameela from the Institute of Bioethics. The special feature of this book is that it is based on Christian Bioethics. It is heartening to see vigorous discussions on WhatsApp groups on these issues and to see answers emerging from this book.
