Chairman's letter

I was in the CEO's office of a private hospital in a city in Western U.P. We were waiting for coffee to arrive; and had to make polite conversation. When we had run out of the usual topics: Mayavati, weather, and traffic in the city, there was a pregnant pause. The CEO's wife, who was a non-medical person, surprised me with a question: "Dr. Thomas, what is your passion in life?" I stuttered and muttered, "You know, I *like* travelling and I *like* reading; well, what about you?" She said, "My passion is to do Puja that is what I love doing". Suddenly, I could sense the emptiness of my own words in contrast to the import of the words she had spoken! It really set me thinking. Did I have a passion in life? One is defined by one's passion. It was Denis Waitley, an American motivational speaker who said, "Chase your passion; not your pension". 

Isac and I were born again during our school days and had committed ourselves to be available to God. We wanted to work where nobody else was willing to go. I was keen to know what God wanted to do with my life. In the early nineties I joined the Dip NB course in Family Medicine, which was a new specialty in India. I felt that this course would equip me for rural work in a mission field setting. Isac was my classmate in the FLM course. We discovered similarities towards missions that attracted us to each other.

After the course, we visited 5 mission stations in 4 different states. We were challenged to see the great need among the Malto tribe of Bihar. We realised that we were not strong or smart enough to pioneer medical ministry among the tribals. God assured us of His approval and assistance. We clung on to the promise in *Isaiah 35:8*. In 1996 with a team of five people, harnessing our faith we made a humble beginning. Thus Prem Jyoti was formed. While the task ahead seemed overwhelming and impossible, we asked God to break us that we may be a blessing to the Malto people.

The Maltos are a diminishing population with an alarmingly high infant and maternal mortality rate. Infectious diseases and deaths related to child birth were very common. The whole district of Sahibganj was backward with poor transport, communication and electricity. God chose to use Prem Jyoti to bring light and love into the lives of the Malto people in the dark corner of India.

Today, Prem Jyoti team has grown to more than 50 strong, a 30 bedded hospital, a good network of community health volunteers and better facilities (8-10 hours of electricity since last year). Our personal lives and growth have been intertwined with that of Prem Jyoti.

If has been a joy to see positive changes within the team and in the community. Illiterate community health volunteers teaching, treating and referring; increasing awareness about prevention of common illnesses; improvement in health seeking behaviour; Malto girls completing their nursing training; pregnant women visiting the hospital for safe delivery the list continues.

completing their nursing training; pregnant women visiting the hospital for safe delivery...the list continues. The Maltos and Santals have turned to the Lord in large numbers – so we are ministering to an outsized believing population. However, the non-tribals rarely know the Lord. Every day we have the opportunity to share the Gospel to our patients. They listen eagerly and witness many miracles of the Lord's mighty hand of healing. In the years to come we look forward to a great harvest of souls for the Kingdom of God.

There have been pit falls; times when we have wondered whether it was worthwhile to spend our best years in the remote jungle; when it seemed as if we were not making any difference whatsoever; when our endurance was tested to the limit; recurrent episodes of malaria in the first ten years; early separation from children for schooling; times when we made mistakes or faced failures; when even God seemed far away – yet with no one else to fall back upon except Him... It was in those valleys that we best learnt the sweetness and all-sufficiency of our Saviour. These life lessons have impacted us the most...

It has been 17 years, since we arrived... and deep down in our hearts we know that in the midst of all the struggles, the Lord has always been holding our hands... and the best is yet to be...

A TRIBUTE— CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF DR. P. I. ABRAHAM

"Love Thy Neighbour as Thyself"

ran the motto of a man who was called to His abode on 14th May 2014. Even as we remember his life and work, may we be inspired to serve our Living God. Dr. Abraham was born on 5th Feb 1923 to Lt Mr. P I Abraham and Lt Mrs. Annamma Abraham. Dr. Abraham imbibed the value of 'Christ-like Living', especially the simple, transparent and just-living with value-based convictions from Mr. P C George (founder of Agathi Mandiram, Kottayam). Dr. Abraham learnt the importance of 'Community Living' from Sadhu Mathai (founder of Christavashram, Manganam, Kottayam). Dr. Abraham stressed the fact that no patient should be denied treatment for want of money. He encouraged and desired that the highest education be provided and the services be rendered to the people who could afford for it the least. He stood for his convictions in Christ. He refused bribes, even if it meant material loss. He also refused awards in view of the greater reward from above. He was accessible to anyone.

Dr. Abraham was greatly inspired and influenced by Jim Elliot and David Livingstone. Jim Elliot's statement became Dr. Abraham's missionary outlook - "He is no fool who loses what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose".

David Livingstone's final conclusion to his friends who pleaded for his reversion of the decision to go into the land of cannibals of Africa, drilled into the mind of Dr. Abraham, that the absolute determination can never be the product of this world. David Livingstone had remarked that the words of the "Gentleman" 'Lo! I am with you always, even to the end of this age," had sustained him through all the years of exile amongst people whose language he didn't understand, whose attitudes were uncertain and hostile.

Dr. Abraham joined the Miraj Medical Center [Maharashtra] in 1943 to do LCPS and pursued the condensed MBBS from KEM, Mumbai. Studying in Miraj, he became a part of the Saturday evening prayer group where he came in contact with Dr. A K Tharien (one of the founders of CFH, Oddanchatram) who was his classmate, Dr Jacob Cherian (founder of Ambillikkai Hospital) who was his junior and Mr. P T Chandapillai, who later joined UESI and thereafter the Evangelical Church.

Two groups were formed and planned to venture into mission fields. The group that went to South-India was the inception of the work at Oddanchatram, Tamil Nadu while the other group went to North-India and started the work at Rajnandgaon, in the then MP state (now Chhattisgarh).

Dr. Abraham felt the need to trust in God's provision for the finance of the Fellowship. For him simple trust and plunging into the deep was a must (*Matthew 6:33*). So, he decided against owning any personal property and bringing all income to a common pool. The "Common Purse" principle was adopted, whereby no one had personal property, but all shared and utilised from a common pool. Further, the society would meet all expenses of each member. Children would be educated by the society.

Before Dr. Abraham started for Rajnandgaon, he made a personal covenant with the Lord; and his prayer was "Lord, help me to have nothing more than what these people have as my personal possession in this world" (make-shift bamboo tents and food pots hung from the bamboo poles fixed just outside the sleeping space, so as to protect from dogs and pigs). He faithfully kept this covenant and God in turn met all his needs until his time on earth.

In 1954, Dr. Abraham married Aleyamma, a girl who had promised to live and face challenges with him in the mission field. She stood by him and helped in nursing management and anesthesia, as well as labour cases, besides looking after their own children. Dr. Abraham lovingly addressed her as ""My Gynecologist and My Anesthetist". Dr. Abraham & Mrs. Aleyamma Abraham have 6 sons, of which the first two and the last two are medical professionals.

INITIATIVES

Dr. Abraham's desire and initiative was to extend medical as well as social help to the community. The community work was organized in the form of a holistic Community Health Service under the name of SHORE (Society for Health Opportunity, Rehabilitation & Empowerment).

Dr. Abraham believed that "Jesus is the answer and only HE can impart the true values to an individual.

A school for the underprivileged was established, to train them with moral values amidst the degrading culture of the community at large, and also coach them so that they would rise to the highest cadres of the community as senior government officials, who would then practice the ethical values in their respective roles. It is located about 50 km from the base hospital to the west on the NH-6 (Howrah-Mumbai Route).

The Hospital work has General & Eye Services. The Farm Services started about 10 years later and has been intended to be the main support unit for the charity services through the hospital and the community as well, so as to reduce the cost of living.

As Dr. P C Abraham looked forward to meet His Father in heaven, he confidently recollected *II Timothy 4: 7-8..."I have run the race; I have kept the faith...".He ended with Psalm 48: 14..." For this God is our God forever and ever... He will be our guide even unto death."* Here was the man who left a legacy that many could follow and bless the future generation.



My first visit to a mission hospital! (Prem Sewa Hospital, Utraula)

Still recovering from the post traumatic stress of exams and not quite oriented, I travelled alone to the Prem Sewa Hospital, Utraula (Uttar Pradesh).

I always heard of people's account of mission trips and wanted to know for myself what it really was like? Was it all just sacrifice or was there something more?

And so work began... and it wasn't like it was back in the cities. I realised the distance people travelled to be treated! Most forfeiting their daily wages, some who in spite of being treated in bigger hospitals and obtaining no relief came here with hope in a "mission" hospital (which had limited resources). The illiteracy and ignorance of the people here was frustrating and sad.

During this time I also happened to read "Promises to keep" - the story of Dr Thomas A Dooley. I was reminded of the importance of the "patient who has a sickness" rather than the "sickness that is in the patient" a simple but important statement but one I had somehow forgotten! I could comprehend the truth of the statement "Dedicate some of your life to others. Your dedication will not be a sacrifice." And so I returned, having received more than I expected, more than I could give. Praise God for He provides things we may not even realise we need!

It is certainly a relevant day-to-day issue for doctors, that pharmaceutical companies promote their products by offering perks of various forms to the doctors. The companies then promptly recover the cost of the perks from the patients by charging a higher price. So, finally the patients have to bear the expense of the perks the doctors receive. Thus the vicious cycle subtly facilitates the spiraling of the cost of medicines. Well conducted studies have proved that the cost of medical treatment has pushed many, especially the poor, below the poverty line. So what is the way out? It is to understand the underlying problem of the desire created by drug companies and their business tactics. We need to take a clear stand that we do not receive any perks from these firms as it finally hurts the patients. Once again to reiterate that our mandate is to PROVIDE ETHICAL, LOW COST, YET EFFECTIVE CARE COMMUNICATING CHRIST AND HIS LOVE. May we all receive the courage and grace to say 'NO' to this temptation.

The Camps at Pachalur are always a blessing. Though this is the sixth time I am attending, I had so much to learn. The theme for the camp was 'Face the Book'. It is difficult to write about people who have given so much of themselves unselfishly. It comes so naturally to them, so much a fabric of who they are.

Karuna was one such special person. We got to know her more through Dr. Giovanni her husband, who regularly visited us, a close friend, a regular face at camps and conferences. Karuna was the one who held the fort at home and the busy hospital they run in Sivakasi. Their home was always open to the extended family and many others.

Karuna was diagnosed with nonsmall cell adeno carcinoma with the primary in her lung on 4 October 2013, with secondaries after investigations for a backache. Over

Karuna passed away in Sivakasi on 24th July 2014. The people of the town asked for a public viewing of her body to pay their respects. Shops downed their shutters and roads were jammed during the time of her funeral.
