CHAIRMAN'S LETTER

The second quarter of 2021 had been an anxiety ridden time with the second wave of the pandemic causing havoc. Those in the health-care work faced tough times not only with the heavy rush and lack of beds to admit, but also with unprecedented lack of oxygen. Often, we were bewildered feeling helpless. **Such times are tests of our faith.**

What is faith? A simple definition would be 'Welcoming that which you believe in'. Faith is not just an acknowledgement of some external fact. It is believing and receiving. "Yet to all who received Him, to those who believed in His name, He gave the right to become the children of God. (John 1:12)." **The key thought underlying the Greek word for faith (pistis) is that of trust.** It is trusting wholeheartedly the One who is worthy to be trusted. Only then can we have the quality of life that is the foretaste of eternity.

Jesus was quick to detect faith in those who came to Him expecting a miracle.

In the letter to the Hebrews, faith is the power to see reality behind appearance. Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see. Hebrews 11: 1

For Peter, faith is the conviction that what Jesus says is true and that we can rely on His word to launch out on His promises (2 Peter 1:4). As a little boy I have often wondered how my father – seen by others as the doctor who comes on bicycle – could ride on the two wheels without falling. When I was a little bigger, I learnt that I too could ride it – only when I was prepared to launch out, even at the risk of falling and getting bruised.

Some have told me that I should have been named Thomas, as I seemed to be a 'Doubting Thomas' always! But I admire Thomas. He was willing to admit his doubts. He was realistic enough to realise that going with Jesus may mean even dying with Him. He may have ended up doubting, but in the end, he courageously lived out his conviction to go and die for Jesus – in India. The "St Thomas Christians" in the west coast of India from the first century are the testimony.

Being a Christian requires courage. We do not often fit in with the world's thinking/ways, and when we refuse to conform, we will most likely suffer some form of persecution as a result. Are we ready for that? Thank God, we are not left alone.

The Bible says that the king of Syria had surrounded the city with his horses. Elisha's servant was greatly alarmed. But Elisha said, "Don't be afraid, those who are with us are more than those who are with them". At Elisha's prayer, the Lord opened the servant's eyes and he saw the hills full of the Lord's army with horses and chariots of fire. May our faith continue to grow and may our eyes be opened to see clearly the whole mountain aflame with light.

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE STAFF DR HERALD ADELAIDE: COORDINATOR - TAMIL NADU

In the beginning of April 2021, COVID-19 cases began rising in Tamil Nadu and the medical college hostels were asked to be vacated. With elections around the corner in Tamil Nadu, slowly other curbs were also put in place. This brought physical meetings to an end in various colleges and hostels. Most medical fellowships resumed online. However, the final MBBS students were expecting their exams and they were allowed to stay back in the hostels. By the end of April, they had completed their exams, and they were awaiting their results due in May to take on the COVID challenge head on.

As many of them expressed their fear and anxiety over deployment in COVID duty without adequate skill and knowledge, an open meeting titled 'Are you ready?' was arranged online on the 15th of May to answer their questions and clarify doubts. Dr Ashok Bhaskar shared from the scriptures. Dr Balamukesh (CMC, Vellore) and Dr Jacinth (Madras Medical College) shared clinical expertise and answered questions in the meeting. The students were expecting the results by that weekend and their colleges to recall them in a couple of days. Sure enough, as the results were announced, some colleges asked their interns to report in a couple of days for observership. By May, the number of COVID cases were nearing their peak in Tamil Nadu and there was a huge demand for oxygen beds, drugs and other accessories for COVID management. More networking had to be done to connect people for appropriate care. During one of the weekly Wednesday prayers of the Madras Doctors group, a question was asked as to how the group could be involved apart from praying. And yet again, during the daily morning prayers when a student was asked as to how they were spending their time, the reply was startling - 'purposeless'. Immediately in the following week Dr Isaac Jebaraj volunteered to start clinically oriented orthopedic online classes. So, this began on the 18th of May and so far, 38 classes have been conducted covering OG (Drs Anita Shirley, Elsy, Emily, Dhanya), Pediatrics (Dr Prabhakar Moses), General and Pediatric surgery (Drs Abraham and Jacob Chacko), CVS (Drs Jesu, Haynes, Arpudh), and Orthopedics. The classes had been widely attended by students from across the state and many teachers started the classes sharing from scripture. We are thankful for the streamlining brought in by Drs Praveen and Johann.

I am extremely grateful for the past year as I was enabled to complete one year with EMFI and the opportunity to work with you all in the Lord's kingdom. I will appreciate prayers for the Lord's guidance in the coming days.

TN MISSIONS CONFERENCE (PACHALUR CAMP) 25th – 27th JUNE 2021 (ONLINE CONFERENCE)

As the number of COVID cases started to decline by mid-June, the students of Tamil Nadu felt that the colleges may reopen by the beginning of July, and hence wanted the Pachalur annual medicos' missions meeting to be held by the end of June.

So the TN Missions Conference (Pachalur Camp as it is fondly called) was conducted over the virtual platform in the month of June 2021. The theme for the conference was **'FAITH, HOPE & LOVE'** taken from 1 Corinthians 13: 13.

The theme speakers were Dr Cijoy Kuriakose (CFH, Oddanchatram) and Dr Arpit Mathew (Madhipura Christian Hospital). While Dr Cijoy expounded on the theme from the word of God, Dr Arpit spoke about its practical implications on our lives as medical/dental professionals.

There was a brief video interview on the history and origins of the Pachalur conference and the hopes and expectations for the future, shared by our Chairman Dr Susheel from Oddanchatram. Dr Deepak Abraham - CMC Vellore, set the tone of the meeting and 3 of the TN-EMFI staff shared in the morning devotions.

We had Mission Hospital presentations from four hospitals; SMART Hospital – Tamil Nadu, Umri Christian Hospital - Maharashtra, Nuajeeven Medical Centre - Odisha and GEMS Hospital, Bihar. We had three testimonies from different doctors - Dr Vikram Tirkey (Ranchi), Dr Wilset, (Jharkhand) and Dr Leslie (Chattarpur). Though there were 388 registrations, the maximum online attendance during the conference was 176. On the second day, we had a time where questions pertaining to contemporary issues raised by the students were answered by Dr Justin Paul, (Chennai) and Dr Bijin Oliver (Vellore). On the whole, the conference was a blessed time for all who attended as we saw from the feedback submitted by the students.

We are very glad that a team of students from different colleges spent time with us working on the logistics for the conference and taking up various responsibilities to see that the online conference went on without any glitches. The sessions had contributions from a vast group of people from across India based in different mission settings. The students actively participated in connecting with resource people, recording sessions, covering interviews and a lot of background work. All this was possible because of the Lord's help as the entire meeting was arranged in a hurry within 2 weeks from the first planning meeting.

Many college fellowships recorded songs that were used aptly during the time of worship. We thank God for this wonderful conference that was made possible even during these challenging times.




LISTENING POST

REFLECTIONS FROM THE GENERAL SECRETARY

As this letter is being written the number of deaths due to COVID is nearing four Lakhs. The official numbers are being questioned, which may well increase this number several times higher. The emotional toll has probably overshadowed the reporting of the economic distress and the plight of the poor and the marginalized. As the second wave ebbs, uncertainty is writ large about the future. Education in general and medical education in particular hangs in balance amidst various speculations.

As EMFI we are faced with caring for an emotionally scarred graduate population and vast number of students who are increasingly stressed out.

Graduates have shared about the fatigue of caring for large numbers of the COVID patients and the concern about not being able to help the non-COVID patients adequately. In addition, they share the pain of having to make ethical decisions, of rationing Oxygen and drugs among many who needed it most. Many also shared about their eyes being opened to the glaring disproportion between the rich and the poor in accessing health care. Many were also disturbed about the large bills that were run up by the corporate hospitals, some of which resorted to cash payments to avoid compliance by the government guidelines. Added to this was the demoralizing news of violence against doctors and other healthcare personal.

Students shared about feeling 'vague, uncertain, fearful, and anxious' about the future. The exams were postponed for some batches leaving them fed up of revising vs preparing for the next year which they had not yet entered. Many said that they could not concentrate on studies as well as have a good 'quiet time' despite having time on their hands. The overuse of media was very prevalent. When classes did start online, they were not of good quality in many instances. Students also lost interest in attending online Bible study events as the novelty wore off.

Interns who did not have clinical postings in the final year of MBBS, found themselves caring for very sick patients. Along with nurses, they were the real front line of care. Even the final year students found themselves involved in the COVID response, mainly in Telemedicine and some coordinating work. On the whole, it was an experience like never-before.

As Many friends, among students and graduates went into bereavement. We also lost a young student who was active in fellowship to COVID. Another student lost both parents and was in grief. Even as others were involved in comforting her she died too. All this has sensitized us towards deepening our involvement with students in getting to know them better, in ways more meaningful than before. In this scenario the staff and graduates associated with us in EMFI were enabled by the Lord to be a voice of encouragement and comfort. The morning prayers from 6.30am to 7.30am everyday were a time when some graduates, students and staff would come and intercede for many issues. A week of prayer from the morning to evening was arranged and it gave us a fresh hope that we will see changes. After a lull, many fellowships began to meet over online platforms and began to grow in listening and offering comfort which was much needed. Sessions which were predominantly spent in listening to each other made us understand each other and pray with empathy.

The Mission Hospitals stepped up in a very special way during the second wave and our staff and graduates have been involved in much prayer and in encouraging them. We were in turn very much encouraged by the sacrificial work of the Missions, especially those situated in the rural areas of North India.

A new and very important venture was the starting of academic classes online. This has come as a big help to some students who number from seventy to hundred. Excellent classes are being taken by senior doctors. The classes are also being recorded and offered to students.

The AP & Telengana students and graduates had a retreat with the theme of Comfort and Hope. It was a blessed time with very good practical sharing from senior leaders like Dr. Kuruvilla George, Dr MC Mathew, Dr Manoj Jacob among others. The TN Missions conference (Pachalur camp) was held in the last weekend of June with the theme Faith, Hope & Love. The theme speakers were Dr Cijoy Kuriakose and Dr Arpit Mathew.

A helpline called 'The Listening Post' has been set up with staff and graduates volunteering to spend time listening to students going through various kinds of stress. The process has been helped by the logistics set up of PISCES led by Dr Vinod Shah.

As staff we have met frequently to pray and to encourage each other. Some of us took ill but the Lord has restored us to health. We have been provided for by His mercies in an uncertain time like this. Our office has continued to function with staff taking turns in keeping it going and others contributing online from Home.

As staff, students and graduates, we have experienced His comfort, encouragement and guidance in this very trying time. We would like to extend our heartfelt thanks, to all our friends who have been involved with us sacrificially. Glory be to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.
