Chairman's letter

One of the temptations of the founders of a mission hospital in a rural area was to stay in the nearby town and reach out to the villagers. Though this was the advice given by well-meaning friends, they decided to reject the "mission bungalow" model and chose to make their dwelling among the villagers, sharing their difficulties and limited facilities.

May the divine incarnation pervade our lives and may it prompt us to share the gospel in the way He did - by reaching down the ladder, by dwelling among our people, full of grace and truth.

There were 60 of us including graduates whose presence was an encouragement to all. Dr Samuel Siddartha, Drs Isaac and Prasanna were our main facilitators. Four students could also join Thiruvannamalai Government from Medical College which was indeed a blessing. A two day visit to Periyamalai was as refreshing as ever to witness what God is doing through his people. This time we were accompanied by Bhuvanesh from Government Medical College, Vellore and Dr Amit's family. We have a small coordinating team for Tamil Nadu. Jeneeta and Merin are student representatives along with Graduates Dr Ashok Bhaskar and Dr Shanti Edward who are a constant source of encouragement and guidance. As we continue meeting, please pray for the coming year and the work ahead, that the Lord's favour will be upon us as we march ahead in His glorious Name. The work in Tamil Nadu is quite demanding having the highest number of medical and dental colleges in the country. Who being in the very nature of God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped - Philippians 2:6

Amid the un-heard, hungry, vehement cries, suppression of the truth & oppression of the poor Indulgence took its place everywhere. Slothfulness crept into the youth; A reluctant attitude towards fellowships; sensuality and pleasure has become a lifestyle. Being broken to the core; not having strength to seek the truth or mercy; the teens are dwindling in hope. Who will think of them? Redeemed ones are restless in pursuing their own interests but not of Christ. The cry of Him (Christ) is not being heard in the noisy streets, neither the pitiable state of these destitute medicos who are aimlessly running with the winds of time. There are many invisible forces with their cunning craftiness, entangling these lives either through depression or in the pursuit for successful careers. There is no one who watches over the students - not even one. There are 65 medical colleges and 28 dental colleges in AP & TS, of which six are Muslim minority colleges - where we have not laid any inroads for fellowship. There are 12,930 UG students joining in these colleges every year. There are about 15,000 graduates passing out from these colleges but we do not know where they go. We have Christmas programs in less than 50% of the colleges to proclaim the gospel. But no follow up to lead them to Christ. Few fellowship retreats, two evangelistic camps but wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction. As Jesus prayed - "Righteous Father, though the world does not know you, I know you, and they know that you have sent me. I have made you known to them, and will continue to make you known in order that the love you have for me may be in them and that I myself may be in them." To this end we could form a prayer line each morning and are able to find rare fruits in AP & TS. The unconquered land is huge. May the Lord grant us at least 100 open homes so that each batch may have at least one boy and a girl student leader in every college.

LINU ZACHARIAH: FIELD PARTNER - TAMIL NADU

Linu could visit college fellowships and graduates at Coimbatore, Salem, Madurai, Titucorin and Tirunelveli. He attended the Christmas program at Salem and will be attending more such programs at Trichy and Madurai. Linu writes, "The major challenges that we find after the COVID time is that the fellowships which started to meet physically have now gone back to online meetings in some places because students have tested positive in the fellowships. Please pray that these fellowships will become more regular and consistent. There are some fellowships struggling to find a suitable place for them to meet together. I have also noticed that the students are losing interest in going to mission hospitals. Another major challenge that we face is the lack of graduate involvement in most of the places because of which students call people of their choice to speak in their fellowships which has resulted in confusions and conflicts."

ANUP KUMAR RANA: FIELD PARTNER - ODISHA & WEST BENGAL

Anup writes, "I give thanks to our almighty God for his grace, mercy, love, goodness and kindness upon me, my family and ministry. I have not been able to reach out to many during this pandemic time. THROUGH THE STORM

I praise the Lord for His mercy, love and guidance. Last year my dad met with a major car accident. The doctor who examined him said that my dad had serious complications and that I should be prepared for the worst. I did not inform his condition to any of my family members but informed my prayer group and started praying for my dad. Within 2 hours they called me to say that his vitals are improving, but before we could be happy about it came the news that he had a compression fracture of his thoracic vertebra which had caused compression over his spinal cord and he had lost all his sensations and motor power right from his abdomen downwards. The doctors said that the probability of him walking again is very low even after surgery and that he needed several months of rehabilition. I have always seen my dad as a very active person who does all his work by himself. But now he was lying in front of me not even able to sit up by himself and needed my assistance to do everything. There was only one thing in my mind, I did not want to question God asking why this happened because He does not make mistakes and He does everything with a purpose. I only asked God for His wisdom and his strength to get me and my family through this storm. There were lots of problems and confusions regarding my dad's surgery and the place we needed to shift him to for his rehabilitation. God did everything for us in ways we could not even imagine. He showed us the right place for dad's surgery and made us get admission for rehabilitation in CMC Vellore. After 6 months of rehabilitation, now my dad is able to do most of his work by himself and also started going to his office using a wheelchair. Life is not the same for us and even now we are praying in faith that God would do a miracle and make my dad walk again. But through all these hard times we have understood that sometimes we have to face some storms in our life that we can't handle. But in everything we can see that God is faithful and He always makes a way for us to overcome and be a living testimony to proclaim the faithfulness of God.

On Call for Missions Anytime

A mega surgical camp was planned from the 18th to the 21st of November 2021, at Periamalia SMART Health centre, Tamil Nadu, with a massive number of patients. About 45 patients were waiting for major surgeries. It was amazing to be a part of the team that comprised of more than ten surgeons including Post Graduates and 2 Anaesthetists.

Initially reaching the place Periyamalai, which is part of the mountainous Ghats section, uphill from Krishnagiri was a big challenge. It was pouring cats and dogs on the day when we started from Vellore. The roads were flooded and visibility was low as we went uphill. So we were given a place to stay in Denginikottai at a beautiful farm house. Then the next day we travelled towards our destination while visibility was still low. Yet by God's grace we reached the place in spite of the landslides and fog on our way.

Dr Jeyachandaran had organized this Surgical camp in SMART (Samaritan mini-health centre). It is a lovely place. We had to operate on almost 45 patients in 3 days. More than 15 Surgical doctors from various specialities were part of the operating team like Urologist, Gynaecologist, Paediatric surgeon, General surgeon, Laparoscopic surgeon and even postgraduate students and Heads of Departments. However, we were just 2 Anaesthetists and 2 postgraduate students available.

Each day started at 9am and ended at 2am of the next day. It is clearly evident of the need of Anaesthetists in such remote areas. Even if someone is available to spend one day in this camp, it would be great for these people in unreached places. To my pleasant surprise my birthday was celebrated with a lot of love and a handcrafted cake by all. This place is an area of great need! Even if a surgeon or Anaesthetist can go for a day, it would be helpful. Dr Jeyachandaran is 78yrs old and has undergone a bypass surgery and is unable to perform surgeries by himself on the large number of patients awaiting surgery.

Serving the Lord anytime in missions needs an open mind and a willing heart to serve people in dire need. Some of us might not be able to work in such areas but we can always spare time like one or two days or even a week to serve in such places.

So why not plan your next vacation with your family or friends to places like Periyamalai that is full of natural beauty and needy patients? So do God's work anytime even if you are busy or even if it means for just one day.

Asha Liran Hospital, Odisha - An urgent Request

We need your urgent and sustained prayers for Asha Kiran Society in southern Odisha. The Asha Kiran Hospital has by God's grace continued working for 30 years to see "Just and compassionate communities, choosing and celebrating life." Over the past 6 weeks we find ourselves in a deep crisis. For months we worked on renewing our blood bank license and general hospital licenses. 2 months ago, an inspection of our blood bank found some errors and it was shut down. Then at a surgical camp, a young boy we operated on developed renal failure and died before he could reach a higher centre. His death led to a case being filed against us and medical authorities conducting an investigation. Though we were not found wanting in the surgical case, the authorities told us not to do any emergency maternity services as we do not have a registered obstetrician. We were also told to stop ultrasound services for the same reason. In the meantime, the local media published multiple stories saying that Asha Kiran Hospital stole the kidneys of the boy – and that the government has shut our hospital down.

Needless to say we are in a deep crisis. We have hardly any patients in our wards or OPD – in contrast to the usual bustle. High risk deliveries are not being cared for. People with long-term Sickle-cell disease are not coming. The whole spectrum of our care has been affected.

Pray for a just resolution to the authorities escalation in demands for specialists to do the same lifesaving work we did for years. Ask the Lord to bring new medical team-members who have trained in obstetrics, anaesthesia and radiology. Pray that God cleanses us with His Spirit and give us unity and joy in these challenging days.

As I write this we have received news that our hospital license has been renewed with the permission to conduct caesarean and other operations. This is fantastic news as the permission is on the basis of 2 doctors having Family Medicine degrees and their training during the course to conduct Caesarean operations being recognised. This hopefully will set a precedent for other mission hospitals without a gynaecologist to follow.

We still need prayer for the blood bank inspection which is going to happen in a few days and the acceptance of Dr Ravi to appear for the ultrasound competency based test to restart vital ultrasounds.

Reflections from the General Secretary

A DISTURBING 'DESCENT'

This is the time where we remind ourselves of the glorious mystery of the incarnation, His descent from the realms of glory into our world of sin, frailty and futility.

Mathew, the writer of the fist gospel begins his narrative about Jesus Christ by writing about an aspect of this descent, one that describes his descent by lineage, a genealogy. It is a historical record which affirms the messiah as coming in the line of Abraham, the father of faith and David the beloved King. Both of them had received great promises which will find fulfilment in the Messiah. Matthew also lists fourteen generations from Abraham to David, fourteen from David to the exile and fourteen from the exile to the Christ, giving the narrative a sense of completeness and beauty.

Matthew however disturbs this beauty by introducing the names of four women apart from Mary, the blessed among women.

Tamar is mentioned first. Her story is a tragic one having several sad components. Widowed in her first marriage she is given her brother-in-law to continue the lineage. He sleeps with her but practices coitus interruptus, depriving her of a child to continue the lineage. When he dies, she is made to wait for the next son to grow up, but her father-in-law Judah, has no intention of giving his next son in marriage to her, though he promises her that he will do it. In her misery she lands up in a sad story of incest with her father-in-law. Out of this incident is born Perez, who continues the lineage. Why does Mathew have to remind us of this disturbing event which is best forgotten in the line of the Messiah, 'The Lion of Judah?'

Rahab is the next woman mentioned. Before coming to see the power of the God of Israel she was a gentile commercial sex worker. Later Salmon would marry her and continue the lineage to the Messiah? Why not just mention Salmon? Why do we need to be reminded of Rahab in the lineage and not just in the list of the people of faith which occurs in the book to Hebrews?

Ruth is the next woman mentioned. She is a Moabite by origin who took shelter under the God of Israel. Why not just mention Boaz and get away with the narrative? Why bring it up here?

The next woman mentioned is 'the one who had been the wife of Uriah.' Is Mathew putting it like tins instead of just saying Bathsheba to jar us with the memory of the horrendous story of adultery, deceit, scheming and murder, committed by Israel's most beloved King. Solomon is the fruit of this incident, the one who will continue the line to the Messiah, who is called the son of David!

Why does Mathew sully the stream? Why does he attempt to pollute our gentle meditation of the infancy narrative of the Holy one to be born?

We can consider two things which may have been on Mathew's mind.

Firstly, the 'sullied past' is not so important for The Father that he will reject it and make his son to be born in a lineage that is 'spotlessly pure', indeed if there be one like that! The Messiah is able to take it. So, there is hope for us. The 'polluted past', either ours or that of our ancestors is within the sphere of our Lord's gracious incoming and acceptance. By his incarnation into this stream of life defiled and destroyed by our disobedience and rebellion, he is willing and able to make it his own in the light of his love and purity. The mess and the curse enter the sea of Grace and receive hope.

Secondly, Matthew may be telling us that the time for endogamy based on 'special' groups of people is not very important to the Lord, now that the messiah is here. Great leaders like Nehemiah and Ezra had acted against Jews marrying gentile women. In the prophet Malachi, the man who marries the daughter of a foreign god is to be cut off from the tents of Israel. But the lineage of the Messiah includes such women and men who married them.

'Caste - based endogamy' is our subtle way of perpetuating the evil of casteism among ourselves. We feed our children with this milk with hints subtle and those not so subtle. Even if the spouse in consideration is a believer and a disciple of our Lord Jesus Christ, we would like our lineage to be unsullied by refusing such a proposal.

Will the Messiah be impressed?

In another context he talked about his coming as 'the new wine'. He wanted us to hold this 'new wine' in new bottles, new structures of thought and feeling, new lives.

We celebrate Christmas in a time, characterized by uncertainty. As we celebrate our Lord Jesus who came among us through a 'disturbing descent', shall we let the 'old gourd' of 'caste-based endogamy' be broken by the glorious new wine?
